

Executive Summary

- The State Govt. for development of Handicrafts had submitted special project proposal to MoRD, Gol with outlays of Rs. 350.00 lakhs. But against this the MoRD, Gol sanctioned a project for development of Handicrafts during the year 2002-03 with an outlay of Rs.300 lakhs. The break-up of the components annunciated has been: a) Central Govt. share of Rs.255 lakhs; b) State Govt. Rs.45 lakhs; and, c) Without the provision of bank loan credit, with the remark that the project activities would be financed through the grants from the central and state govt. The main handicraft activities to be promoted are: Carpet Weaving, Crewel Embroidery, Sozni Shawl Embroidery, Tilla- Embroidery, Paper Mashie and Chain Stitch Embroidery, etc.; For this purpose the project envisages:
 - a) Establishment of 14 Production Centres @ one production Centre per Block at Baramula, Bandipora, Boniyar, Hajin, Gurez, Pattan, Rafiabad, Rohama, Sopore, Sumbal, Tangmarg, Uri, Wagoora and Zaingeer-one hall, one store room one office and one bath room- for 50 workers (Rs.98.00 @ 7.00 lakhs per Centre)
 - b) For marketing set-up constructing 5 show rooms at Gulmarg, Sopore, Baramulla, Bandipur and Uri for display and sale of the handicrafts products of Craftsmen (10.00 @ 2.00 lakhs per show-room).
 - Processing plant / unit at a suitable location in Baramulla for washing and finishing of the products (Rs.12 lakhs).
 - d) Load Carriers-2 for transportation of raw material and finished products (Rs.10 lakhs)
- The fund utilization as yet is low, as only Rs.61.057 lakhs, i.e. 56.53% of the fund earmarked and made available to BDOs and are accounted for. The audit of the accounts has not been done for the year 2003-04 / 2004-05. No CA has been engaged so far. BDOs and PO had no clear idea about this.
- Apparently the whole attention of the Project Authorities is on the construction activities that too without any systematic planning and scheduling of the activities and their linkage to the other Project activities, work on which should have been planned and initiated in right earnest for expected outcomes, e.g. social mobilization to select beneficiaries and SHG formation., the process for which requires considerable time and effort.
- A sum of Rs.7.00 lakhs for construction of Handicrafts Centre and Rs.2.00 lakhs per show room have been placed at the disposal of concerned BDO who get these executed through the concerned Engineering Department. There is no proper and scientific monitoring of the construction activities as to what extent, quality and specification these construction and their fixtures and fittings have been completed or are there gaps therein or missing items, BDOs claim that these are not the only works with them and they are busy with other poverty alleviation and development work with them.
- Regarding the method of selection of beneficiaries, it was learnt that the process is yet to start. There was no clarity on whether SHGs would be formed or not and, if so when and how? DPIC was yet to take a decision on the matter as the present emphasis was on taking up construction activities and their completion as a priority. Further, neither concrete step for the formation of SHG's have been initiated, nor any social mobilization has been attempted so far by the DRDA. No programme has been drawn up for the purpose so far nor the content of the training and places / institutes, etc decided.
- The Project Officer, DRDA only having monitoring role is not in accordance with the SGSY approach. He may not be able to have full control over the expenditure and pace of project implementation. Besides, maintaining accounts and auditing the accounts in accordance with the terms of project sanction, may be a difficult proposition. The Comments and Observations on the Project implementation put forth below need an immediate attention. Since the Project has been sanctioned under SGSY, its concept and approach, should be followed in letter and spirit.
- The NRIF towards the end has provided the <u>Recommendations</u> for MoRD, GoI with the remark that the release of 2nd installment of central assistance be considered only after: PO, DRDA, Baramulla sends the audited accounts for the year 2004-05 to MORD, GOI; At least 80% of the available funds have been utilized; The process of social mobilization for identification of potential beneficiaries and SHG formation has been taken up by the PO, DRDA, Baramulla in right earnest; The final list of the swrojgaris has been drawn up after due screening through the association of the Gram Sabhas; Arrangement for equipping and operationalization of the HPCs and thereafter show rooms and related infrastructure (e.g. Processing unit and Carrier) as also procurement of raw material are completed.
